State Library Victoria advises some new digitised records are now available online for those researching the life and times of their Melbourne metropolitan ancestors – a selection of Sands & McDougall directories ranging from 1860 to 1974 have been digitised and uploaded to the State Library website – and searching by keyword/name is a breeze!

Something to note, from 1902 onwards, the directories also cover country Victoria, and I've found that some Albury businesses (just over the river from Wodonga in NSW) have adverts listed too.

You'll find detailed street by street information for Melbourne and the suburbs, and lengthy lists of names for country areas. Though, keep in mind, it wasn't compulsory to be listed.

You can access the collection of directories via the SLV's digitised collection library

– and while you're there, you should definitely check out the other records they have listed.

Also, the Melbourne History Workshop (part of Melbourne Uni) has digitised a collection

Family Search Website Did you know that 70% of the documents on FamilySearch.org cannot be found using name search? A **search by locality** will yield much better results.

When visiting FamilySearch.org you will see a prompt to register for a free FamilySearch account or to sign in to their existing account to continue enjoying all the free expanded benefits FamilySearch has to offer. Since its launch in 1999, FamilySearch has added millions of users, billions of various historical records, and many fun, new features like [Family Tree](#), [Memories](#), [mobile apps](#), [digital books](#), and [dynamic help](#). In order to accommodate continued growth of these and future free services, FamilySearch must assure all its partners that its content is offered in a safe and secure online environment. **Patrons creating a free account and signing in fulfills that need.**

Patron sign in will also enable FamilySearch to satisfy the ongoing need for user authentication. This authentication can deliver rich, personalized discovery, collaboration, and help experiences. Simply put, signed-in visitors can access more searchable content and enjoy more personalized services.

“A large percentage of our current site visitors are not benefiting from much of what FamilySearch has to offer because **they don’t realize the need to simply sign in with their free account to do so,**” said Steve Rockwood, FamilySearch CEO. “They are basically arriving in the parking lot but not coming inside for the main event,” he said about website visitors who do not sign in.

FamilySearch is committed to patron privacy and does not share personal account information with any third party without a patron’s consent.

On Line Wills for England and Wales Wills and other probate materials dating from 1996 are already on the internet. Now the database has been expanded to cover the years from 1858 – the year Probate Service records begin – to 1996. Including indexes and source documents, it is one of the country’s largest online resources, and will complement the public’s growing interest in genealogy.

Despite a will being intensely personal, many people do not realise that it is, barring a few exceptions, a public document.

Although they will not be able to read the wills at their computers for free, users can search the database at home and then buy copies for **£10 each**. The wills, covering England and Wales and owned by Her Majesty’s Courts and Tribunals Service (HMCTS), and were painstakingly scanned in by hand.

HOW YOU CAN CLICK INTO HISTORY

Log on to www.gov.uk/search-will-probate and create an account.

Choose the section you wish to search – Wills and Probate 1996 to present; Wills and Probate 1858 to 1996; or Soldiers’ Wills.

There are two search fields – the surname of the deceased and year of death. Both must be filled in. You can also carry out an advanced search, which requires more information.

In the 1996 to present section, a list of results will appear, giving the names, date of probate, probate number, date of death and registry of each person with that name. For instance, for a person called Stanley Wood who died in 2005, there are 12 results. To order a document, click ‘Add to basket’.

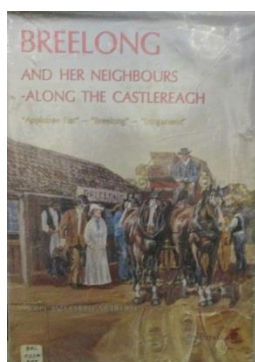

Under the 1858 to 1996 section, a page from the probate calendar for that year is returned in search results, providing summaries of names, birthplace and other details. These must be typed into an online ordering form on the right of the screen.

Click on 'Proceed to checkout' to pay. Some documents take up to ten days to be sent as electronic copies. The files can be accessed for 31 days.

Irish Ancestors Many of us are searching for information on our Irish ancestors. The North of Ireland Family History Society offers a wealth of resources for anyone searching in the six counties of Northern Ireland and three Irish border counties. It may well be worth your while to check out their website at www.nifhs.org for more information.

BREELONG AND HER NEIGHBOURS ALONG THE CASTLEREAGH a book compiled by John and Cheryl Mudford was published in 1988. This book covers information on colonisation as well as indigenous knowledge in the Breelong, Appletree Flat and Eringanerin area. This excellent reference book contains maps, illustrations etc. and is available to read in our Family History rooms as well as at Dubbo Regional Library.

Trove Newspapers There are over 200 million articles already on the National Library's Trove Newspapers website and more are added every month. If you are not very experienced in searching Trove Newspapers, open the website at <http://trove.nla.gov.au/newspaper/> and click on **Help**, then open the **Using Trove** link where you should find some helpful tips. Basically, you have to think about how things would have been written in the paper at the time, which can be quite different from today. Use of forenames was less common than today, so a man who might be called Bill Smith today, would possibly be referred to in an old newspaper as Mr W (or Wm Smith) and his wife Mary, would probably have been called Mrs Wm Smith. You can often narrow down your Trove search by combining a place name (or occupation) with a surname and if you get too many hits, it is simple to refine the results, perhaps to a state, single paper or date range.

Keep in mind that the articles are indexed from the old newspapers using Optical Character Recognition (OCR) which can result in errors occurring in the text due to the poor quality of the newspapers. Remember also that you can search NSW Government Gazettes from 1832 to 1900.

UK Family Tree Magazine for December 2017 has an interesting article on how to use the results from your DNA testing for family tree research. The same magazine has information on how to trace your ancestors in the early 1800's.
