COVID-19 virus outbreak is impacting on everyone in a huge way. Our society is no different with events such as Share Your Story, our Annual General Meeting and working bees having to be cancelled. Our rooms are also closed until further notice. Let's hope the situation improves soon and we can all get back to a relatively normal life.

From our president Linda Ideas to stop you going stir crazy while times are mad.

With our rooms being closed I am already having withdrawal symptoms — I've even started house cleaning! While emails and phone calls are important so we stay in touch and while they will help fill some gaps, now is the time to focus on some of the things that you may have put on the back-burner. Here are some ideas that you may find helpful.

- 1. Remember all those photographs you were going to sort/scan/ organise? Perhaps now is the time.
- 2. Have you been planning to write your life-story? How often have you thought that it would have been great if your grandparents had left you some clues? Make your grandchildren happy and start jotting down some memories. It may help to use headings such as 'Birthdays', 'Christmas', 'Holidays', 'A New Baby' or the like to get you started. Perhaps you could create a timeline of your life.
- 3. Revisit you family trees. Have you made recent discoveries that you haven't yet documented? Are there new resources available that might fill in some gaps or even answer those mysteries? Do you need to do some serious reorganizing so that your hard work will be more easily understood by those who come after you?
- 4. And finally, a tip to get more out of your online searches. You can create more accurate searches by specifying that the terms you search are near each other and not just anywhere on a page. To do this in Google you use AROUND(3) (or any number you choose) between the terms you have entered eg "George Parsons" AROUND(3) Inverell.

 'Trove' uses a slightly different method. Use the ~ (tilde) symbol (it is near the top left-hand side of my keyboard) to set the distance between your keywords. For example: "George Parsons"~3 will match items with 'George' and 'Parsons' within 3 words of each other. Hope this keeps you busy for a while and helps with your 'brick walls'.

Watch the newsletter, face book and email for more ideas while we all limit our distance from others. Please stay safe.

Other additions relate to convict records, shipping and passenger records and military and biographical records for British garrisons in Australia to 1837.

Patrick and Margaret were married on 20 October 1909 in Coolamon, NSW. Margaret died in Dubbo on 2 April 1957 and Patrick died 10 June 1963. They are both buried in the Roman Catholic section of the Dubbo Cemetery.

New book publication We have been advised by Margo Piggott of Gilgandra that she has published a book titled 'Gilgandra & District WW1 Diggers'. This book will be of local interest as she has researched behind the names of those soldiers on the War Memorials and Honour Rolls in Armatree, Collie, Curban, Gilgandra, Gulargambone, Mendooran, Tooraweenah and Eumungerie. Also included are the Coo-ee and the Kookaburra Recruitment marches and the stories of the re-enactments. Other chapters describe Women at War and at Home, Peace and the Aftermath and the Centenary Commemorations Across the District 1914-1918. The alphabetical listing of the diggers tells the stories of known diggers and the digger database lists the names on all the memorials.
