John Gilbert Engineer Story (Con't) A letter John received from the RAAF Directorate of History Services - Air Force, dated 26th January 2020 confirms his presence by stating unequivocally that JBG was the "lead Australian bombardier in attacks on Japan in 1945". Whether this was based out of the Philippines or Okinawa, and involved attacks on the Japanese mainland or just coastal shipping, can probably never be known now that John has died. His former American squadron, the 65th, operated from the Philippines until the middle of July, and then from Okinawa after the 23rd July, so it is certainly feasible that he may have re-joined them temporarily for a handful of raids. Unfortunately, we will never know. Back in Townsville (late July or 1st August) John was offered promotion by the RAAF to Flight Lieutenant and the position of Bombing Leader of all Australian bombers in Borneo. The role there was to disrupt enemy shipping in the South China Sea, once again with the aim of blockading Japan and forcing her to surrender. At that time, it was assumed by everyone that the War was likely to last at least another one to two years and that Japan would probably have to be starved into submission. No one, except for a few key senior people, could have had any inkling that two atomic bomb blasts would shortly put an end to the war much sooner than that.

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
John flew from Townsville to Morotai (an Indonesian Island) on the 2nd to the 4th August, via Cooktown, Cape York, Madang, Hollandia & Mokmer (on the Indonesian Island of Biak). On 22nd August 1945 he then flew Morotai to Balikpapan (Indonesia) via Tarakan where he joined the 82 Strike & Reconnaissance Wing HQ, but of course by then, on the 15th August, 1945 Japan had surrendered.

As part of his demobilisation, he joined an 82 Wing Detachment at Morotai between the 8th and 30th October. Finally, he was flown from Morotai (Indonesia) to Laverton (Vic) via Darwin on 30th-31st October 1945. This was the end of John's operational days with the RAAF.

Back in Sydney John sought to gain matriculation to Sydney University to study Civil Engineering. This was approved and under the Government's Reconstruction Training Scheme, John and the University were funded to undertake this degree.

John was discharged from the RAAF with rank of Flight Lieutenant on the 23rd February 1946. He graduated from Sydney Uni in 1950 and rejoined the DMR in Parkes that year, initially as a Draftsman but then in July as a Professional Engineer. In January 1951 he joined Orange City Council as its first Deputy City Engineer, and in March 1953 was accepted for the position of Municipal Engineer at Dubbo. *And the rest, as they say, is history.*

No doubt John mentioned flying over Parkes as he was born there in 1923. His father, Thomas "Charlie" Gilbert, was 43 when John was born, and a veteran of three wars - the Boer War and Boxer Rebellion with the Royal Navy and Gallipoli/Western Front with the AIF. Charlie Gilbert won the Military Medal at Pope's Post on Gallipoli and was promoted to both Sergeant and Acting Sergeant Major in France before being invalided home with various war injuries. (The war service history of Charlie Gilbert would be an interesting story in itself).

By the time John reached high school age his father was in his mid-fifties and in failing health. Charlie's invalid pension was tiny and John left school at 15 to support his parents financially. He gained a Draftsman's position at the DMR in Parkes against 100 other applicants from all across the Central West, and then studied privately at home for his Leaving Certificate, which he passed in 1939.

National Records of Scotland have recently added thousands of volumes of historical records from 1559-1900. These cover millions of pages from the kirk session and other court records of the Church of Scotland, containing details of key events in communities across the country. Another Scottish website www.scottishindexes.com recently added over 100,000 prison register entries. This website has a vast array of indexes which may be helpful if you are researching your Scottish ancestors.

Find My Past in partnership with the Family History Federation, recently added 3.4 million **burial records** to the National Burial Index. All the data was collated from the burial records of Anglican parishes, nonconformists, Roman Catholics, Quakers and other cemetery records within England and Wales. They have also published a vast new collection of **Australian passenger lists** from 1826 right up to 1972. Although 1972 seems very recent to most of us, it is actually nearly 50 years ago!!
